An avid history buff, Dan had an especial interest in the American Civil War. He was a supporter of University of Illinois and United States Naval Academy athletics, especially during the time that his two sons played tennis at those schools. Above all, Dan enjoyed time with family. He was a dependable, genuine, calm presence who was always available to be an attentive listener and to give his complete support whenever needed. Never needing to be the center of attention, Dan provided a quiet leadership that made those around him feel a comfort, security and warmth that will be forever missed.

Richard **Dean** (by Jeff Stonehill): Richard Dean came in later as a transfer student and graduated early, about Jan. 1972, as an English major, and he was going for a Masters degree specializing in the poet John Milton at Claremont, I think, in California. He was a TKE but didn't fit in that well as a frat brother, being shy and intellectual and not an athlete, but he was one of my best friends. He had an older brother attending Beloit and his family was part of the Dean Milk family. Richard and I used to talk about classes, world news, philosophy, etc. and he helped motivate me into becoming a better student when I returned from my Field Term and vacation term in Europe (my grades during my first 5 terms were about 2.5 as contrasted with the 3.75 average in my last 4 consecutive terms, starting with the summer of 1971 and ending with the 9th tuition free summer term in 1972). I still remember him giving me a lift in his red Porsche to Beloit's then Greyhound Bus depot, after one term's end when I was returning to NY via flying from O'Hare. Richard came to Manhattan en route to Europe (while we were still Beloit students, I think) and he ate dinner with my parents and me at our apartment on E. 14th St. He managed to leave his passport in the apartment which I discovered after he left so took mass transit to return it to him at the artsy Chelsea Hotel on W. 23rd St., as Richard was scheduled to fly the next day. I bumped into him literally on a London sidewalk (I didn't know he was in London) when I was there as a Field Term worker in the fall of 1970. He said he would be driving in France and Germany and we made plans to go together once my work term finished but later he canceled as the timing didn't work for him. At Beloit, Richard became the boyfriend of Pam Taylor '71, who I thought was a great girl and very smart and witty. They lived together in California. While Richard was in school in California and later working there, he and I used to exchange correspondence. I was sorry to learn that he was in a fatal car accident (but lack any details about that), dying young in Jan. 1981. I sent the last and lengthy letter from him to me, which included amusing scribbles (after making a photocopy for myself) to Pam as I thought she might like to read his thoughts but I never heard from Pam again. She passed away years later from what I read in the Beloit Magazine, which saddened me.

Dr. Mark Lowry Friedell, 65, of Orlando, Florida passed away July 10, 2016 in Kansas City, Missouri. He was raised in Newton, Massachusetts, son of Dr. and Mrs. Gilbert Friedell, brother to Anne Lewis, Dr. Benjamin Friedell, James Friedell, and Sarah O'Connell. Dr. Friedell attended Beloit College where he played football and was a member of the SAE fraternity. He attended medical school at the University of Bologna in Bologna, Italy where he met his wife, Donna. They were married on December 30, 1977. Dr. Friedell did his Surgical Residency at the University of Massachusetts and his Vascular Fellowship at Beth Israel Hospital in Newark, New Jersey. His first position was at the Chicago VA Hospital and he was on the faculty at the University of Chicago Medical School. He went on to practice vascular surgery as well as become the Program Director and Academic Chairman of Surgical Education at Orlando Regional Medical Center (ORMC). At the time of his death, Dr. Friedell was the Ralph R. Coffey Professor of Surgery and the Chairman, Department of Surgery at the University of Missouri - Kansas City School of Medicine. Dr. Friedell is past president of the Florida Vascular Society and also past president of the National Association of Program Directors in Surgery (APDS). He also belonged to numerous local and national surgical societies. His life was devoted to the teaching and mentoring of surgical residents and medical colleagues. Among his accomplishments, Dr. Friedell was instrumental in creating the Level 1 Trauma Center at ORMC and the results of his work came to bear during the recent tragedy in Orlando. He is survived by his wife, Donna, and his sons, Nick and Alex Friedell.

Bruce "Barney" E. **Fyfe**, 66, of Dunedin, FL went to be with his Lord early Friday morning March 24, 2017 at Mease Dunedin Hospital, surrounded by his loving family.

Bruce was born in New Jersey. His mother spent three months in bed awaiting his arrival. Bruce arrived early and got to spend almost two months in a hospital incubator. Bruce always seemed to be a little ahead of his time.

In 1964, his family moved to New York City, where Bruce completed high school. He attended Beloit College in Beloit WI, graduating in 1972 with a BA in history. In 1975, he obtained a paralegal degree in fiduciary law from New York University. Following graduation Bruce secured a job with Manufacturers Hanover Trust. He was the youngest Trust Officer for the bank.

In 1980, Bruce grew tired of freezing weather and moved to Florida. He began working at Park Bank in 1982 and, while there, created the first private banking division in the state of Florida. He left the bank in 1985, starting his own financial planning firm, Personal Resource Management, with a handful of clients.

In 2000, Bruce merged his firm with Provise Management Group LLC. Bruce worked with many great people at Provise. One of the special people in Bruce's life at Provise was Eric Ebbert, his friend and partner. But even more important to Bruce were his many clients, whom he always rightfully referred to as his friends. And they in turn were supportive of Bruce, especially in his desire to help those in need in the community.

Bruce met his wife, Wanda in August 1990 and they were married at Everybody's Tabernacle in 1992. Bruce was a member of Everybody's Tabernacle and taught adult Sunday school and also provided occasional sermons in church. Bruce never claimed to be a preacher, only a teacher. Bruce's faith and love of God showed in his passion to help those in need. Bruce was diagnosed with idiopathic pulmonary fibrosis early February 2017. During the struggles with his illness he never questioned his faith and told everyone he was ready to go to heaven.

Through the years, Bruce was involved in and supported many local organizations including Homeless Empowerment Program, Morton Plant Mease Health Care, Baycare, Morton Plant Mease Health Care Foundation, Clearwater Free Clinic, Big Brothers Big Sisters, Habitat for Humanity of Pinellas County, Humane Society of Pinellas County, and Charity Works.

Bruce served as Chairman of HEP, Homeless Empowerment Program (formerly the Homeless Emergency Project) for 23 years. During this time, with the help of HEP's dedicated staff, volunteers and Board of Directors, he was able to help the organization to expand from two employees and a budget of \$100,000, to over 60 employees with an operating budget of over \$5 million, serving just under 400 homeless individuals, families, and veterans per day. During his chairmanship, he was instrumental in the growth and expansion of the nonprofit, overseeing the development of HEP's campus from a collection of trailers used for offices and housing to the expansive eight-acre campus that exists today.

Most notably, Bruce and his wife, Wanda were responsible for the construction of HEP West Veteran's Apartments and Clubhouse. Inspired by the untimely death of his son, Brendan, a U.S. Marine who served three combat tours in Iraq, HEP West serves as respite for homeless veterans - specifically those who suffer from Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder and Traumatic Brain Injury. Bruce was a man of selfless devotion, and was never one to seek the limelight. He was often an unsung hero, who was quick to give credit to others. It was only in recent years that he was publicly recognized for his work on behalf of HEP, having received awards for his philanthropic work. In 2012, Bruce was honored with the Lighting Community Hero Award, and in 2013 by the Invest in Others Charitable Foundation which allowed HEP's name to be placed in lights on the world famous NASDAQ Market Site in New York City's Times Square - a true professional highlight in Bruce's career. In addition, financial gifts from these prestigious awards benefited homeless veterans residing at HEP. Bruce will be deeply missed by the entire HEP family, and his generous spirit will live on in the lives of those he helped.

Bruce served on the Morton Plant Hospital, Morton Plant Mease Health Care, and BayCare Board of Directors for nearly 30 years. Bruce also served in many capacities including Chair for both the Morton Plant Mease Health Care Foundation and hospital boards. During that time, he was directly involved in the building of the Cantonis ER-1, the Turley Family Health Center, the Bardmoor Outpatient Clinic, the Cheek-Powell Heart & Vascular Pavilion, the Morgan Heart Hospital, Ptak Orthopedic and Neurosciences Building, Axelrod Pavilion, Carlisle Imaging Center, Susan Cheek Needler Breast Center, Mease Countryside expansion, Jacobsen ER, Mease Dunedin Harris ER, Morton Plant North Bay Hospital, Starkey Tower, Tiedemann Tower, Doyle Tower, and programs such as the Dr. George Morris 'Earn As You Learn' and so much more. Bruce felt his best achievements were the merger of Morton Plant Hospital and Mease Hospitals without the need for additional litigation, and creating the Foundation's Community Impact Grant Process. Bruce was a passionate and honorable man who believed access to quality health care is an essential component to life, community, and family.

In addition to his loving wife, Wanda, Bruce is survived by his son, Alec; his dog, Duke; brother, Richard Fyfe and his wife, Choi Fyfe of Jacksonville; sisters-in-law, Barbara Green, Bonnie Slaughter, Audrey Patnaude, Pat McAbee, all of Clearwater and Judy McAbee of Kennesaw, GA; brothers-in-law, Nate McAbee and Pastor David McAbee of Clearwater, Charlie McAbee of Homosassa, and Max McAbee of Kennesaw, GA as well as 22 nephews and nieces and 24 great-nephews and nieces. Bruce Fyfe was also the father of the late Brendan Fyfe.

Alice **Gates** is reported to have died on 11/30/2004.

Alicia **Gordon** died suddenly in her home in Topanga, CA, on January 19, 2004. She was 53. She is already sorely missed by the many who knew her in the translation and Macintosh user communities, in Southern California and more especially in cyberspace.

As for many of us, translation was a second or even a third career for Alicia. She was born and raised in Brooklyn, New York and attended Hunter College High School, a competitive magnet school in Manhattan, where she graduated with honors. Upon graduation, she ventured away from the city to Beloit College in Wisconsin, where she majored in economics and minored in physics. After college, she ventured even further afield to spend a decade living and working in Europe. For two years, she taught English and business at the École Supérieure de Commerce et d'Administration d'Entreprises in Nantes, France. For eight years, she lived in Seville, Spain, where she coordinated an overseas study program for the University of North Carolina, studied music at the Seville Conservatory, played guitar or her flute in some flamenco rock groups, and worked as a translator on the side.

When she returned to the United States in the 1980s, she settled in Los Angeles and soon moved to Topanga, which she loved and then never left. She put her foreign-language skills to use in jobs as a sound engineer (she worked on the Spanish soundtrack of Star Wars) and production of advertising commercials, which led her deeper into the entertainment industry. As Gordon Artists, she became a talent agent representing jazz and international musicians, handling booking, management and public relations. Her clients included guitarist Pepe

Habichuela and modern flamenco groups Pata Negra and Ketama from Spain, Limpopo from Russia and Ivan Lins from Brazil, for whom she arranged U.S. tours and, for the latter two, appearances at the World Cup in 1994.

In the mid-1990s Alicia switched careers entirely to become a full-time translator, renaming her business Gordon Word Artists. Alicia was a splendid example of how life experience, in- depth knowledge of many technical areas, curiosity, a passion for detail, persistence, and love of language can, without university translator courses, lead to success in professional translation – a career path of which Alicia was proud and which she communicated enthusiastically to others. She obtained accreditation from the American Translators Association (ATA) in Spanish to English and French to English and acquired the first of a series of Mac computers, of which she became an ardent devotee. She was soon working for clients around the world by phone, fax and e-mail from her remote canyon location. As she put it, she specialized "in subjects from the technical to the creative, with a broad base of knowledge to draw on in the areas of contract law and jurisprudence, business and marketing, high tech computer applications, audio-video, telecommunications and broadcast electronics, and I save a niche for the music and film business." Her experience in the entertainment industry gave her an edge in subject matter related to it, especially broadcasting and licensing but not excluding adaptation of scripts for lip sync or subtitles. For the ATA conference in Los Angeles in 2002, she drew on her music industry background to book the band and make the arrangements for the Friday evening "World Dance Party" at the conference hotel.

Today translators take it for granted that cooperation across international borders and continents is the norm. A mere 12-15 years ago, however, this was something new. Through her indefatigable willingness to help a colleague, and her presence on the first non-university computer translation forum to be accessible anywhere in the world – CompuServe's FLEFO (where many of us first came to know her) – as a sought-after Mac specialist and regular contributor to the Wordfast user group (to which she had posted just days before her death), she was instrumental in establishing and maintaining bonds between translators everywhere, thus pioneering international cooperation between colleagues.

For her distinguished work, her commitment to her fellow-translators and Macintosh and Wordfast User Groups, and her never-failing willingness to help others both professionally and personally, we thank her one last time and pay our respects. The gap Alicia left will take a long, long time to fill.

Alicia leaves behind her only sister, Jane, and niece Jenifer who arranged this memorial site to celebrate Alicia's life.
